

En un comentario del P. Paul Holmes (NJ), te invita a ponerte en el lugar de Tomás, quien se une a sus compañeros en medio de la histeria colectiva, afirmando que alguien que llevaba tres días muerto y enterrado está muy vivo. Tengo el presentimiento de que sentirías lo que él sintió y dirías lo que dijo.

No recuerdes las dudas. Recuerda que Tomás quería ver las Llagas. Jesús necesitaba que alguien viera sus heridas.

Esto es importante: aunque su sufrimiento y muerte son cosa del pasado, su futuro contenía las heridas que sufrió. Jesús era Dios. Vivió en la tierra durante tres décadas antes de ascender al cielo. Quería que supiéramos que, incluso en el cielo, aún conserva esas heridas.

Marissa Papula dijo que incluso hoy, Dios carga con las heridas de la Crucifixión: las historias desgarradoras de refugiados y migrantes; los recortes de fondos; las visas revocadas y las voces slientiadas; los derechos y el derecho al voto negados; el caos constante sembrado. En todas estas imágenes y más, la Imagen del Crucificado anuncia su Presencia.

Gracias a esas heridas, Dios nunca olvidará lo que hizo por nosotros. Nunca. Sucedió y sigue sucediendo en las innumerables guerras y la profanación de nuestra ciudadanía y nuestro planeta. Sus heridas son un recordatorio eterno de cuánto nos ama Dios.

Además, las heridas de Cristo son un signo de la misericordia de Dios. Jesús necesitó a Tomás, su valentía e insistencia para ver sus heridas y su misericordia.

Nuestro amado Papa Francisco, nacido para la vida eterna esta semana, escribió un libro titulado "El Nombre de Dios es Misericordia". Creía que la misericordia tiene la capacidad tanto de soportar el sufrimiento como la alegría, el trauma y la esperanza. La misericordia ofrece refugio para nuestras complejas vidas.

Morning, Church!

In a commentary by Fr. Paul Holmes (NJ), he invites you to put yourself in Thomas' place, who joins his companions while they are in the grips of mass hysteria, claiming that someone who had been dead and buried for three days is very much alive. I have a strong hunch that you'd feel what he felt, and say what he said.

Don't remember the doubting.

Remember Thomas wanted to see *The Wounds* and Jesus *needed* someone to see his wounds.

This is important: even though his suffering and death are in the past, his future contained the wounds he suffered. Jesus was God. He lived on earth for three decades before ascending to heaven. He wanted us to know, that even in heaven, he still has those wounds.

Marissa Papula said that even today, God bears the wounds of the Crucifixion: the scarred stories of refugees and migrants; funding slashed; visas revoked and voices silenced; rights and voting rights denied; constant chaos sown. In all of these images and more the Image of the Crucified announces his Presence.

Because of those wounds, God will never forget what he did for us. Never. It happened and continues to happen in the countless wars and desecration of our citizenry and planet. His wounds are an eternal reminder of how much God loves us.

Also, Christ's wounds are a sign of God's mercy. Jesus *needed* Thomas and his demanding courage and insistence to see his wounds and mercy.

Our beloved Pope Francis, born to eternal life this week, wrote a book called, *The Name of God Is Mercy*. He believed mercy has the capacity for both suffering and joy, for trauma and hope. **Mercy** is a refuge in our complex lives.

*We are luminous, broken beings striving
to dance through our faithjourney,
holding hurt and hope,
while inviting **Mercy** to join us
when we choose to meet one another
with compassion, intentional listening and love."*

*Blessed Carlo Acutis
Canonized Postponed*

Canonization of Carlo Acutis is postponed due to Pope Francis' death.
In the **Jubilee of Teenagers** in Rome, he is the first millennial saint. This will bring many young people to Rome for the **Catholic Church's Jubilee of Hope**. Carlo Acutis, who died of leukemia in 2006 at the **age of 15**, was known for his devotion to the Eucharist and Marian apparitions, which he catalogued on a website he designed.


His beatification, or declaration as "Blessed," occurred in October 2020.

The recognition of two miracles attributed to his intercession, including the healing of a young Costa Rican woman, paved the way for his canonization.

Acutis is also considered a "patron saint of the Internet" due to his interest in computers and his miracles website.

Divine Mercy

In today's Gospel we hear about the first time that Jesus came to the Apostles after He rose from the dead. He breathed on them and told them that they had the power to forgive sins. Jesus had just given us the Sacrament of Confession- now a priest could take God's place to hear our sins and tell us that we are forgiven.


