¡Buenos días, Iglesia!

Probablemente la escritura más popular utilizada en la ceremonia nupcial sea 1 Cor. 13:1-13. “El amor es paciente, el amor es bondadoso...” y lo más probable es que tú puedas recitar el resto. El amor, proclama Jesús, es el mandamiento más grande con un doble mandato: amar a Dios de todo corazón, en mente y espíritu Y amar a tu prójimo como a ti mismo. Aquí radica el problema. El amor se ve bien, muy bien sobre el papel en Corintios, hasta que realmente intentas vivirlo.

Con todas las idiosincrasias, límites y quebrantamientos de nuestra naturaleza humana, amar a Dios, a nosotros mismos y a los demás es mucho más difícil y, a menudo, decepcionante. Verás, siempre tendremos vecinos. Siempre. Nuestros vecinos pueden ser miembros de la familia, la gente de al lado, los dependientes de la tienda, la persona que nos corta el paso en el camino, un refugiado, una persona de color o alguien que habla de manera muy diferente a nosotros. Más cerca de casa, nuestro vecino puede ser un adolescente que no limpia su habitación o alguien que no se esfuerza en contribuir a la familia.

En general, nuestros vecinos están tan confundidos, desorganizados, volubles o tan desordenados como nosotros y, en la mayoría de los casos, nos ponen a prueba. Nuestros vecinos son nuestro reflejo en el espejo. Si algo de nuestro prójimo nos molesta es porque nos reconocemos en él.

¡Nuestros vecinos no se parecen al elenco de una simplista película navideña de Hallmark! A veces amar a Dios y al prójimo puede parecer imposible. Por más "sentirse bien" que sean, las películas de Hallmark son visual y emocionalmente pura fantasía. Amar a nuestro prójimo y ser amado por nuestro prójimo es profundamente imperfecto y casi siempre poco confiable.

¿Cuántas veces nuestras lenguas han estado lejos de ser angelicales, nuestros corazones impacientes, crueles, celosos, pomposos, inflados, groseros, egoístas, irascibles, cavilando sobre las injurias o regocijándose cuando nuestro prójimo se equivoca? Amar puede ser muy complejo. Amar a Dios y a nuestro prójimo exige toda nuestra atención e intención, reconociendo que sólo el favor de la gracia de Dios puede inspirarnos a amar.

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¿Por qué es tan difícil amar a Dios y al prójimo? Quizás sea porque no lo hacemos de todo corazón. Amamos transaccionalmente, siempre esperando que nuestro prójimo nos afirme, nos pague o recompense por nuestro “amor”.

Por otro lado, “ama a tu prójimo como a ti mismo” tiene sus propios desafíos. ¿Cómo podemos amar al prójimo si nos amamos a nosotros mismos pobre y condicionalmente, o creemos que no merecemos amor? Necesitamos dejar de lado nuestras costumbres infantiles.

“Cuando era niño, hablaba como niño, pensaba como niño,
razonar de niño; Cuando crecí, dejé de lado las cosas infantiles”.

Cumplir el Gran Mandamiento de amar a Dios y al prójimo de todo corazón es un tema central a medida que la temporada electoral llega a su fin. Podemos amar a los demás porque Cristo está con nosotros, porque Cristo nos amó primero a nosotros, por muy desordenados y limitados que somos y seguiremos siendo. Nuestro amor imperfecto es una invitación abierta a Dios para que intervenga en nuestras relaciones y trabaje en nosotros mientras trabajamos en nosotros mismos. Este Gran Mandato, este antiguo Shemá del Deuteronomio, es un mandato que todos necesitamos para liberarnos de nuestros arrepentimientos y de nuestro egocentrismo basado en el miedo.

Este Mandamiento tiene las manos y el corazón de Cristo por todas partes. Todos sabemos lo que sucede cuando Cristo nos toca y cumple sus promesas. Somos transformados en Amor, transformados en gracia. Fuimos creados en Amor y estamos llamados a amar a Dios y al prójimo de todo corazón, indiscriminada y generosamente. Ese es el Comando. Nada más, nada menos.

Morning, Church!

Probably the most popular scripture used in the wedding ceremony is 1 Cor. 13:1-13. “*Love is patient, love is kind...*” and you, most likely could recite the rest of it. Love, Jesus proclaims, is the greatest commandment with a two-fold mandate: Love God wholeheartedly, in mind and spirit AND love your neighbor as you love yourself. Herein lies the snag. Love looks good, really good on paper in Corinthians, until you actually try to live it.

With all the idiosyncrasies, limits, and brokenness of our human nature, loving God, ourselves and others is much more difficult and often disappointing. You see, we’ll always have neighbors. Always. Our neighbors can be family members, the folks next door, the store clerks, the person who cuts us off on the road, refugee, person of color or who speaks quite differently than we do. Closer to home, our neighbor can be teenagers who won’t clean their rooms or someone who won’t put in any effort to contribute to the family.

All in all our neighbors are as confused, disorganized, fickle, or as untidy as we are, and, most often sit on our last nerve. Our neighbors are our mirror image. If something in our neighbor irks us, it’s because we recognize ourselves in them.

Our neighbors do not resemble the cast on a simplistic Hallmark Christmas movie! At times, loving God and neighbor can seem impossible. As “feel good” as they are, Hallmark flicks are visually and emotionally pure fantasy. Loving our neighbor and being loved by our neighbor is deeply imperfect as it is almost always unreliable.

How many times our tongues have been far from angelic, our hearts *impatient, unkind, jealous, pompous, inflated, rude, self-seeking, quick-tempered, brooding over injuries, or rejoicing when our neighbor messes up?* Loving can be very complex. Loving God and our neighbor demands our full attention and intention, recognizing that only the favor of God’s grace can inspire us to love.

Why is loving God and neighbor so hard? Perhaps it’s because we fail to do so wholeheartedly. We love transactionally, always expecting our neighbor to affirm, repay, or reward us for our “love”.

On the other hand, “love your neighbor as you love yourself” has its own challenges. How can we love neighbor if we love ourselves poorly and conditionally, or believe we are undeserving of love? We need to put aside our childish ways.

“When I was a child, I used to talk as a child, think as a child, reason as a child; when I grew up, I put aside childish things.”

Fulfilling the Great Commandment to love God and neighbor wholeheartedly is front and center as the election season comes to a close. We can love others because Christ is with us, because Christ loved us first, as messy and as limited as we are and will continue to be. Our imperfect loving is an open invitation to God to intervene in our relationships, and work in us as we work on ourselves. This Great Command, this ancient Shema from Deuteronomy, is a command we all need to free us from our regrets and our fear-based self-centeredness.

This Command has hands and heart of Christ all over it. We all know what happens when Christ touches us and keeps his promises. We are transformed in Love, transformed in grace. We were created in Love and we are called to love God and our neighbor wholeheartedly, indiscriminately, and generously. That is the Command. Nothing more, nothing less.




