¡Buenos días, Iglesia!

Edwina Gately es autora de muchos libros, es líder de retiros, directora espiritual y fundadora del Movimiento Misionero Voluntario (1969) que envía misioneros a tres continentes. Fundó Genesis House (1983) en Chicago, que es una presencia de extensión para mujeres en prostitución. En su libro, *Soul Sisters: Women in Scripture Speak to Women Today*, ella comparte una experiencia personal de La Mitad de la Viuda proclamada en el evangelio de hoy y presagiada en 1 Reyes 17. Edwina trabajó como voluntaria durante tres años en Uganda, en el este de África. Esta es una reformulación de una historia de ese libro.

La Viuda del Evangelio me recuerda a otra mujer. Sus ojos eran profundos, como los de su viejo y pobre Santo Predecesor. Aquí la piel, toda seca y arrugada también. La conocí cuando vivía como misionera en Uganda, África Oriental, en una época turbulenta de guerras tribales que estrangularon un país que alguna vez fue hermoso y fértil. El hambre y el miedo eclipsaron la tierra, dejando a su gente temblando.

La mayoría mientras la gente se iba (riqueza y privilegios son iguales). Algunos de nosotros nos quedamos solidarios con las personas a las que habíamos venido a servir. Sin embargo, fue difícil, no podíamos viajar para comprar comida y esas cosas. Entonces no teníamos mucho. Sin embargo, sabíamos que la gente local tenía mucho menos que nosotros; siempre lo tuvieron. Más aún ahora.

Un día, mientras estaba afuera de mi casita, vi a una anciana que se acercaba arrastrando los pies, agarrando un paquete bien envuelto en hojas de plátano. Ella me miró desde su posición encorvada y muy encorvada. Sus ojos eran profundos y húmedos, como los de su Santo Predecesor. A diferencia de ella, ella no tenía monedas, sólo el paquete de plátanos que me puso en las manos. Sus palabras, susurradas en un inglés entrecortado, todavía permanecen conmigo:

“Gracias por quedarte con nosotros”.

Luego, tropezó, sin nombre y misteriosamente, de regreso a los arbustos desde donde se arrastró.

Intrigado, quité las hojas de plátano. Allí encontré, todos acurrucados y calentitos, un regalo, un tesoro: tres pequeños huevos de gallina... Todo lo que ella tenía, me lo había dado, aunque yo lo tenía todo. Tres huevos diminutos: una fortuna para su pobreza.

Ella es la Ácaro de la Viuda sin disfraz revelado a mí.

Reflexionando sobre la Palabra

¿Recuerda algún momento en el que dio libre y generosamente, aunque también estaba en necesidad?

¿De qué manera la generosidad de estas tres viudas te atreves a ser más generoso?



¿Qué debemos decir o hacer ante tanta bondad? ¿Qué me puede hacer el regalo, dado mi millón de ácaros? ¿Cómo puedo personificar la generosidad en ese pequeño regalo que me desafía a la grandeza? ¡Cómo te atreves, Jesús, a desear que tu visión penetrante, tus palabras incómodas, me dejen luchando en tal espacio! ¡Cómo te atreves, Mujer Africana, a dejarme tus tres preciosos huevos, agobiándome con tus tesoros!

No puedo ni abandonarlos ni olvidarlos. Tus óvulos, como las monedas que dio tu Santa Hermana, están eternamente guardados dentro de mí. Aún más profundamente, encerrados en mi conocimiento más profundo están tus ojos, hermana. Son como luces encendidas que me llaman a deshacerme y compartir mi generosidad, mis “huevos”, a cambiar mis bienes acumulados por un espíritu más rico, transparente en sencillez, hermoso en desnudez – ¡pero, oh, tan vulnerable!

¿Me atrevo, hermana, a cambiar mis tesoros por un alma empapada de gracia? ¿O mis tesoros se encuentran no tanto en las monedas o en los huevos mismos, sino en el deseo de conservarlos? ¿Las riquezas que debo compartir son gracias del espíritu más que bienes de la tierra?

Son mucho más valiosos que la plata o el oro, o las acciones y participaciones. ¿Me atrevo a cavar en mi corazón para generar bondad, compasión y amor más allá de las expectativas, más allá de la razón, para que fluya como un río a mi alrededor, calmado y refrescando los espacios secos y solitarios que se mantienen ocultos en las almas humanas? ¡Ah, eso es todo! ¿Debo volverme como Dios, todo vacío, todo compasivo, abriendo mi corazón para derramar quién soy? ¿Es eso todo? ¿Es eso, hermana del alma? ¿Me convertiré en tí?

Morning, Church!

Edwina Gately, is an author, retreat leader, spiritual director, and founder of the *Volunteer Missionary Movement* (1969) that send missionaries to three continents. She founded *Genesis House* (1983) in Chicago, an outreach presence for women in prostitution.

In her book, *Soul Sisters: Women in Scripture Speak to Women Today*, she shares a personal experience of *The Widow's Mite* prefigured in 1Kings17 and proclaimed in the gospel. Edwina volunteered for three years in Uganda, E. Africa. The following is a retelling of one of her stories from that book.



The Unnamed Widow in today's gospel reminds me of another poor woman who had deep, old eyes and skin all dried and wrinkled, like her Holy Predecessor. I met her when I lived as a missionary in Uganda, East Africa, in a troubled time of tribal wars that strangled a once lovely, fertile country. Hunger and fear eclipsed the land, leaving its people trembling.

Most white folk left (wealth and privilege equal choice). Some of us stayed in solidarity with the people we had come to serve. It was hard, though, we couldn't travel to shop for food and stuff. So we didn't have much. Yet we knew that local folks had a lot less than us – they always did — and even more so now.

One day as I stood outside my little house, I saw an old woman shuffling towards me, clutching a package all wrapped tightly in banana leaves. She looked up at me from her bent and badly stooped position. Her eyes were deep and moist, like her Holy Predecessor. Unlike her Holy Predecessor, she had no coins, just a banana parcel which she thrust into my hands. Her words, whispered in broken English, remain with me still:

"Thank you for staying with us."

Then, off she stumbled, remaining mysterious and nameless, back into the bushes from where she crept.

Intrigued, I peeled away the banana leaves. I found, all snuggled and warm together, a gift, a treasure – three tiny chicken eggs...All she had, she'd given to me, though I had all. Three tiny eggs – a fortune against her poverty.

She is revealed to me as
the unmasked *Widow's Mite*.



What am I to say or do before such goodness? What is the gift to do for me, given my million mites? How can I ever personify the generosity in that little gift that dares me to greatness? How dare you, Jesus, wish your penetrating vision, your discomforting words, leave me struggling in such a space! How dare you, African Woman, leave me your three precious eggs, weighing me down with your treasures!

I can neither abandon nor forget them. Your eggs, like the coins your Holy Sister gave, are eternally held within me. Even more profoundly, locked in my deepest knowing, are your eyes, Sister. They are like burning lights calling me to divest and share my bounty, my "eggs"; to trade my accumulated goodies for a richer spirit, one transparent in simplicity, lovely in nakedness, and oh, so vulnerable!

Dare I, Sister, trade my treasures for a grace-soaked soul? Or are my treasures found, not so much in the coins or eggs themselves, as in the desire to hold them? Are the riches that I must share graces of the spirit rather than goods of the Earth?

They are far more precious than silver or gold, or stocks and shares. Dare I dig into my heart to bring forth kindness, compassion, and love beyond expectation, beyond reason, to flow like a river all around me, soothing and refreshing the dry and lonely spaces kept hidden in human souls? Ah, that's it! Must I become as God ~ all emptying, all compassionate, cracking open my heart to pour out who I am? Is that it? Is that it, Soul Sister, will I become you?

Our talents, and everything we have, come from God. God wants us to share generously with others. This is what being a *good steward* means.


What does Jesus want you to share with others?

How can you become a *good steward* of the gifts and talents God has entrusted to you?




