Jan's Newsletter (paraphrased): Beloved friends.

As we prepare to enter December, I am thinking again about how for so many, the holidays are an intense swirl of sorrow and stress. When people tell me about wanting to hide under the covers until the new year, I understand.

Even as I hold the truth of this, I want also - more than ever this year - to claim the wild and fierce hope that lives so deeply in Advent. This kind of hope is not dependent on "someday." It does not wait for a particular configuration of circumstances to finally come together just right.

Morning Church!

A recently-coined cultural term is *woke*. It means being aware of and actively attentive to important facts and issues, especially issues of racial and social justice. For some it's just jargon or slang while others use it in weaponized, condemning speech against those who take a stance against inequality and injustice.

Isaiah, a prophet of God's Hope, declares to the Chosen that God will continue to provide for their needs, even though they have been unfaithful to their Covenant with God. Like our ancestors in faith, we fail to express to God any awareness, gratitude, awe, or reverence \sim that God truly deserves.

Mountains *quake in God's presence*. If nature is *that woke*, why are we so unconscious of Divine Presence? Is it our busyness, a lack of faithfulness to personal prayer, an arrogant sense of entitlement, absenteeism from our Sunday Eucharist, etc.? Or something else?

We have undeniable evidence of God's compassionate Presence. God is *Divinely Woke* and hyper-vigilant to our every experience, thought, indecisiveness, fears, hopes, wonderment, and worries. What will it take to rouse our hearts to be *spiritually woke*, to rise to a level of watchfulness that motivates us to be who God dreamed we'd be before time and Creation; and to stand together in solidarity against every injustice and judgy, anti-gospel position in God's Neighborhood?

Each of us is given these Advent days to reflect on our *spiritual wokeness*, on how we respond to the Divine Presence within and among us.

This Advent begins a *New Year of Grace*. It is definitely an *unrepeatable* time on our faithjourney. "Be watchful! Stay alert!" Become *spiritually woke*!

Churchwomen of El Salvador



On 12/02/80, four U.S. Catholic missionaries: Maryknoll Sisters Maura Clarke & Ita Ford, Cleveland Ursuline S. Dorothy Kazel, and lay missionary Jean Donovan, ministering in El Salvador, were assaulted and murdered by five Salvadoran National Guard. In 1984, the Guardsmen were sentenced to 30 years in prison. In 1998, they confessed to the murders ordered by two generals. The generals were given U.S. residency in FL for 25 years, until their deportation to El Salvador in 2015. These two generals have never admitted ordering the murders.

All make the sign of the cross as the leader says: Our help is in the name of the Lord. Response (R/): Who made heaven and earth.

Then the Scripture is read. Choose from:

- Isaiah 9:1-2, 5-6;
- or Isaiah 63:16-17, 19;
- or Isaiah 64:2-7:

Reader: The Word of the Lord. R/: Thanks be to God.

With hands joined, the leader says: Lord our God,

we praise you for your Son, Jesus Christ: he is Emmanuel, the hope of the peoples, he is the wisdom that teaches and guides us, he is the Savior of every nation. Lord God, let your blessing come upon us

as we light the candles of this wreath. May the wreath and its light be a sign of Christ's promise to bring us salvation. May he come quickly and not delay. We ask this through Christ our Lord. R/: Amen.

The blessing may conclude with a verse from "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel": O come, desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of humankind; bid ev'ry sad division cease and be thyself our Prince of peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel. †


Retirement Fund for Religious

Why We Ask

- In 1988, Catholic bishops of the United States launched the Retirement Fund for Religious to address the significant lack of retirement funding for Catholic sisters, brothers and priests in religious orders.
- For most of their lives, elder religious worked for little to no pay. There were no 401(k) plans or pensions.
- Religious communities are financially responsible for the support and care of all members. Income, earnings and expenses are managed separately from the parish and diocesan structures of the Catholic Church.
- Only 6 percent of the religious communities providing data to the National Religious Retirement Office are adequately funded for retirement; 42 percent have 25 or fewer members. Many small communities struggle to care for elder members due to a lack of financial resources and personnel.
- Today, religious past age 70 outnumber religious younger than age 70 by nearly three to one.
- There are 24,005 religious past age 70 living in the United States. In 2022, the average annual cost for their care was roughly \$55,500 per person; skilled nursing care averaged \$82,700 per person.
- Since 2009, the annual cost to support senior women and men religious has exceeded \$1 billion.
- In 2022, 71 percent of the religious communities providing data to the National Religious Retirement Office had a median age of 70 or higher.
- The average annual Social Security benefit for a religious is \$7,679, whereas the average lay US beneficiary receives \$21,902.

How Donations Help

- Each year, hundreds of US religious communities receive financial assistance made possible by the Retirement Fund for Religious. Communities can use this funding for immediate retirement expenses or invest it for future needs. Since the first collection, US Catholics have donated more than \$975 million.
- Since the collection began, almost \$842 million has been distributed to support the day-to-day care of elderly sisters, brothers and religious order priests. An additional \$102.6 million has been allocated toward self-help projects initiated by religious communities, including collaborative health-care facilities.
- In addition to direct financial assistance, proceeds from the annual collection underwrite educational programming, services and resources that enable religious communities to evaluate and prepare for long-term retirement needs.
- Support from the Retirement Fund for Religious helps religious communities care for senior members while continuing important ministries to the People of God.

Fondo para la Jubilación de Religiosos

Por qué pedimos

- En 1988, los obispos católicos de los Estados Unidos lanzaron el Fondo para la Jubilación de Religiosos para responder a la preocupante falta de fondos para la jubilación de hermanas, hermanos y sacerdotes de órdenes religiosas católicos.
- Durante la mayor parte de su vida, los religiosos ancianos trabajaron recibiendo escasos salarios o ninguno. No tenían planes 401(k) ni pensiones.
- Las comunidades religiosas tienen la responsabilidad financiera del sustento y atención de todos los miembros. Los ingresos, las ganancias y los gastos se manejan en forma independiente a la parroquia y demás estructuras diocesanas de la Iglesia Católica.
- Sólo el 6 por ciento de las comunidades religiosas que proporcionan datos a la Oficina Nacional de Jubilación de Religiosos está adecuadamente financiado para la jubilación; el 42 por ciento tiene 25 o menos miembros. Muchas comunidades pequeñas tienen dificultades para cuidar a los miembros ancianos debido a la falta de recursos financieros y de personal.
- Hoy, los religiosos mayores de 70 años superan en número a los religiosos menores de 70 en una proporción de casi tres a uno.
- Hay 24,005 religiosos mayores de 70 que viven en Estados Unidos. En 2022, el costo anual promedio para su atención fue más o menos de \$55,500 por persona; y la atención especializada promedio de enfermería fue de \$82,700 por persona.
- Desde 2009 el costo anual para mantener a las religiosas y religiosos ancianos ha superado \$1 mil millones.
- En 2022, el 71 por ciento de las comunidades religiosas que aportan datos a la Oficina Nacional de Jubilación de Religiosos tenía una edad promedio de 70 o más.
- El beneficio anual promedio del Seguro Social para un religioso es de \$7,679, mientras que el beneficiario estadounidense laico promedio recibe \$21,902.


Cómo ayudan los donativos

- Cada año, cientos de comunidades de religiosos en EE. UU. reciben ayuda financiera del Fondo para la Jubilación de Religiosos. Las comunidades pueden usar estos fondos para gastos inmediatos de su jubilación o invertirlos para necesidades futuras. Desde la primera colecta, los católicos de EE. UU. han donado más de \$975 milliones.
- Desde que comenzó la colecta se han distribuido casi \$842 millones para apoyar el cuidado diario de las hermanas, hermanos y sacerdotes mayores de órdenes religiosas. Unos \$102.6 millones adicionales se han distribuido para proyectos de autoayuda iniciados por comunidades religiosas, incluidas las instalaciones de atención médica colaborativa.
- Además de la asistencia financiera directa, los ingresos de la colecta anual garantizan los programas educativos, los servicios y los recursos que permiten que las comunidades religiosas evalúen y se preparen para las necesidades de jubilación a largo plazo.
- El respaldo del Fondo para la Jubilación de Religiosos ayuda a las comunidades religiosas a cuidar a los miembros ancianos mientras continúan sus importantes ministerios para el Pueblo de Dios.




