

Our redemption has a social dimension because "God, in Christ, redeems not only the individual person, but also . . . social relations." To believe that the Holy Spirit is at work in everyone means realizing that he seeks to penetrate every human situation and all social bonds. . . . Accepting the first proclamation, which invites us to receive God's love and to love him in return with the very love which is his gift, brings forth in our lives and actions a primary and fundamental response: to desire, seek and protect the good of others. (Pope Francis, Evangelii Gaudium, no. 178)

As a nation, we share many blessings and strengths, including a tradition of religious freedom and political participation. However, as a people, we face serious challenges that are both political and moral. This has always been so, and as Catholics we are called to participate in public life in a manner consistent with the mission of our Lord, a mission that he has called us to share. As Pope Francis teaches,

An authentic faith. always involves a deep desire to change the world, to transmit values, to leave this earth some how better than we found it. We love this magnificent planet on which God has put us, and we love the human family which dwells here, with all its tragedies and struggles, it hopes and aspirations, its strengths and weaknesses. The earth is our common home and all of us are brothers and sisters. If indeed "the just ordering of society and of the state is a central responsibility of politics," the Church, "cannot and must not remain on the sidelines in the fight for justice." (Evangelii Gaudium, no. 183)

In this fight for justice, God gives us a special gift, hope, which Pope Benedict describes in Caritas in Veritate as "bursting into our lives as something not due to us, something that transcends every law of justice". Thus we take up the task of serving the common good with joy and hope, confident that God, who "so loved the world that he gave his only Son," walks with us and strengthens us on the way (Jn 3:16). God is love, and he desires that we help to build a "civilization of love"—one in which all human beings have the freedom and opportunity to experience the love of God and live out that love by making a free gift of themselves to one another. Pope Francis encourages us in *Evangelii Gaudium* to meditate on the inseparable bond between our acceptance of the message of salvation and genuine fraternal love . . .

God's word teaches that our brothers and sisters are the prolongation of the incarnation for each of us: "As you did it to one of these, the least of my brethren, you did it to me"

(Mt 25:40).

The way we treat others has a transcendent dimension: "The measure you give will be the measure you get" (Mt 7:2).

It corresponds to the mercy which God has shown us: "Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful. Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you . . . For the measure you give will be the measure you get back" (Lk 6:36-38).

What these passages make clear is the absolute priority of "going forth from our selves toward our brothers and sisters" as one of the two great commandments—which ground every moral norm and as the clearest sign for discerning spiritual growth in response to God's completely free gift. (no. 179)



Morning, Church!

All of us can own the gap between our truth and our deceit, especially when someone calls us out with, "Are you for real?" This confronting question engages our immediate defensiveness. It evokes a bunch of retorts as this haymaker lands on our fragile ego and strips away our duplicities.

"Are you for real?" is the spiritual line in the sand that Jesus utilized throughout his preaching and his example. Jesus says before we judge our dear neighbors near and far, we must look inward and confront our own hypocrisies. This gospel makes us mindful of what is truly real in our hearts and what isn't. God's Word helps us see ourselves as God sees us.

Hypocrite (Gk.) meaning actor, stage performer. It's a compound noun that literally translates as "an interpreter from underneath." This bizarre compound makes more sense when you know that the actors in ancient Greek theater wore large masks to mark which character they were playing, and so they interpreted the story from underneath their masks. Hypocrite means to "play a role".

The Pharisees seem to give mere lip service to their relationship with God/Love while holding fast to their relationship with The Law. Without owning their own transgressions and duplicities, hypocrites judge others they deem to be unreal in their relationship with God/Love and The Law. What prevents their ownership? Plain and simple: *pride and ego*. What fosters their ownership: *humility*.

When God's Word unmasks our hypocrisy, it draws a spiritual line across our hearts and demands a real change, a real conversion of heart in us.

How can we overcome the fear attached to unmasking our hypocrisy and our judgmental blindness?

How do we avoid the temptation of *looking good* vs. *being good*?

The epistle offers us this grace:

Humbly welcome The Word that has taken root in you, with its power to save you. Be doers of the Word and not hearers only. Don't delude yourselves.

Humility is the virtue that kicks pride's hypocrisy to the curb and honors our blest realness in God. Humility means we neither "add or subtract" from The Word. (Deut) No tweaking is necessary. Just live The Word wholeheartedly.

Next time you wash your hands or do dishes, remember Christ's invitation to humility and integrity. Let's close duplicity's gap. Let's be *for real*.

In CommUNITY.



Humility invites us to stay low to the ground so that we can find the treasures there.

Not so low that we become a doormat, subject to whatever treatment others may mete out to us.

Instead, humility helps us to remain grounded in the best sense of the word: centered in the *humus* (from the Earth) from which we have been created, the gloriously ordinary Earth from which God made each one of us.

Humility enables us to recognize our dependence on the One who fashioned us as well as our kinship with those who share this Earth, this *humus*.

In practicing humility, we leave room for the surprising and graced ways that God works ~ beyond expectation, beyond privilege, beyond status ~ at the table and in every place beyond it.


